

	Income Tax Assistance program (VITA) provides free income tax preparation assistance to individuals and families with a household income of \$60,000 a year or less. VITA helps taxpayers obtain all eligible tax credits and deductions, especially the Earned Income Tax Credit, Child Tax Credit, Education Tax Credits and Child Care tax deductions. By offering this service for free, we can help more individuals and families maximize their returns while achieving greater financial stability. This session will discuss the impact of the VITA program for individuals and families across our 9 county footprint, roles for volunteers (ages: 16+) that are needed for the upcoming tax season time, and how you and students can get involved to improve financial stability for families across Michigan. Volunteers learn valuable skills and have to have no prior experience in taxes to volunteer. All training for volunteers is provided by our team virtually or in person with additional support as needed. After this session, you will have the opportunity to share this information to your students and families who need this service as well as information on opportunities for you and/or your students to volunteer.


